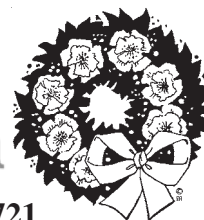

Tree Planting at Pulaski Park Sat., May 14th

In May we planted trees at Pulaski Park. In addition to folks from St. Luke's we were joined by parishioners from St. Pete's, members of Green Futures, of the Garden Club, of the Fall River Street Tree Planting Program. Two planters even came all the way from western Massachusetts, where they were volunteering for the Heifer Program. Among our volunteers were Jennifer Heald, Skylar, Beth, Debbie Baker, Bob Mercier, Ernie, Michael Gosselin, Sam Phin and others. Rev. Hornsby organized

the event writing a grant to the RELeaf Ministry of the United Congregational Church. The ministry, which is administered by the Commonwealth Dept. of Conservation and Recreation, gave us about \$4,000 to buy trees. We put in 20 trees starting at 8:30 a.m. and finishing at 11 a.m. The City of Fall River dug holes with a backhoe and supplied stakes and materials. At noontime the group had a ceremony to pray for the environment and bless the trees. Rev. Jim and Fr. Steve Salvador led the procession, and everyone had the chance to splash holy water over the saplings. During the hot summer watering was a real chore, and very much needed. Ten gallons of water weekly except when it rained (not often enough) allowed most of the trees to survive. We had some casualties, we think,

mainly because we mistakenly chose some which die in drought conditions. Now the youth group will continue to take out the stakes, store them in the basement and get ready for the next planting. And, oh yes, water some more next summer.

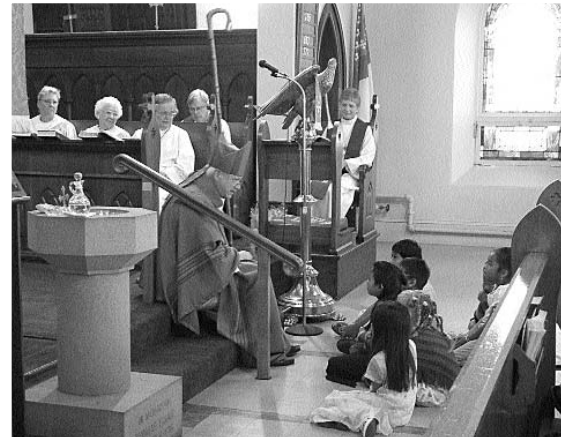
Bishop's Annual Parish Visitation

On September 11th Bishop Bud Cederholm visited St. Luke's. During our worship service, four individuals were baptized and one candidate received the Sacrament of Confirmation. The newly baptized included 2 Cambodian women, Siphon Pao and Vanna Chourb and 2 Cambodian youth, Jordan Nim and Frankie Yam. The candidate for confirmation was Mary Rin Buth, a Cambodian woman who has been worshipping with us for many years.

The bishop's message to the children was simple yet very informative. The children had the opportunity to gather around the bishop during his talk with them. Bishop Bud sat on the steps leading to the chancel area of the sanctuary and played his guitar. He educated the children, as well as the congregation, about the symbolic meanings of the bishop's miter and crosier. Before we closed, Bishop

Bud offered a blessing for the recent renovations we have done in our sanctuary and for the new senior choir robes purchased this past spring.

After the service, the bishop met with the youth of our community. This visit generated new ideas and possibilities for the leadership among our congregation's youth. St. Luke's, as usual, put on a wonderful buffet lunch with all the fixings – American food, as well as Cambodian cuisine. The bishop commented on how much he loves to come to St. Luke's because he knows that the various ethnic foods we serve are outstanding. As customary during bishop visitations, Bishop Bud met with the Vestry after lunch. During their time together, the Vestry had opportunity to share the joys, thanksgivings, and concerns our parish experience as we continue to share in the various ministries we offer – both within the parish itself, as well as the community outreach ministry that is indeed a big part of St. Luke's mission. Bishop Bud offered resourceful ways in which we as a community of



faith might want to explore for building community and increasing parish growth.

The bishop's visitation came to a close around 3:00 p.m. It was a celebration that included not only good food and conversation, but it was also a joyous occasion to "officially" welcome five new brothers and sisters in Christ into our parish family.
